INTRODUCTION

This document is the Summary of the State of Wisconsin's performance in the fourth year of its 2010-2014 Consolidated Plan. The Consolidated Plan guides the State's use of U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) formula funding for housing, community, and economic development.

The State 2011-2013 Biennial Budget transferred programs previously administered by the Department of Commerce to the Department of Administration, Division of Housing (DOA-DOH). In July of 2011, the Department of Administration developed a revision to its 2011 Action Plan to reflect these statute changes including the transfer of responsibility for developing the Consolidated Plan and its related documents to the DOA-DOH.

For Wisconsin's 2013-2014 program year, this report highlights the activities and achievements of the four HUD formula grants - Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), Home Investment Partnerships Program (HOME), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA). The Department of Administration, Division of Housing, administers all four formula programs. This report also summarizes the State's housing activities that are funded through other Federal formula programs, competitive and special grants, and State appropriations.

This Summary is based upon the guidance of HUD's Consolidated Plan Management Process Tool (v.2.0), the consolidated plan final rule published on February 9, 2006, and the Federal Register Notice dealing with Outcome Performance Measurement Systems, dated March 7, 2006.

ACTIVITIES

CDBG Programs:

• Funds distributed statewide, except in CDBG entitlement jurisdictions.

Economic Development (ED):

• \$110,000 award was made to a Unit of General Local Government (UGLG) for businesses to create, expand, or retain jobs benefiting low- and moderate-income (LMI) individuals.

Public Facilities (PF):

- 35 awards totaling \$12,319,936.
- Funds were made available through request for proposal (RFP) process to local governments.
- Funded activities: streets, water and sewer projects, community facilities (senior centers, fire stations, etc.) as well as other facilities serving LMI, disabled, elderly and developmentally disabled individuals.
- Award amounts ranged from \$100,000 to the City of Menominee to \$506,000 to the Village of Chippewa Falls.

Public Facilities for Urgent Local Need (PF):

• Additional 4 awards totaling \$2,250,000 were Urgent Local Need awards.

Slum & Blight Elimination:

• 1 PF award totaling \$230,400 was made in 2013-2014.

Planning Grants:

- 7 awards totaling \$105,000 in 2013-2014.
- Eligible activities: specific planning projects for major local economic or community development proposals or regional economic initiatives.

Housing:

- 7 multijurisdictional awards were increased by approximately \$6.3 million.
- Grant awards were increased by a range of \$800,000 to \$900,000, per region, for a total grant by region between \$1.9 million to \$2.4 million.
- Eligible activities: acquisition, rehabilitation, and homebuyer assistance, for activities that benefited low-and moderate-income households.

Special Projects:

- 5 awards totaling \$2,513,499 in 2013-2014 for the Emergency Assistance Program to the City of Boscobel and the counties of Crawford, Douglas, Grant, and Outagamie.
- 2 awards totaling \$75,000 (CDBG-SOAR) to support continuing SOAR programs with enhanced case management services for potential SSI and SSDI participants that are homeless and have mental illness.
 - Outagamie Co. (\$25,000)
 - Racine Co. (\$50,000)

HOME Programs:

Funds are distributed statewide, except in HOME participating jurisdictions, and require 25% match from grant recipients.

Rental Housing Development (RHD):

- \$4,275,250 was awarded for 11 projects to provide affordable rental housing units to households with incomes that are at or below 60% of the county median income (CMI).
- Funds are made available through an RFP process.
- Eligible activities are acquisition, rehab, conversion and new construction of rental housing.

Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA):

- \$741,458 was awarded to 8 agencies providing rental assistance, making it possible for families to pay down consumer debt, obtain job training, education or employment that will support their ability to maintain permanent housing.
- Eligibility: families with income equal to or less than 60% of county median income.
- Project targets include: families at risk of losing housing, households with children in which teenage parents are enrolled in high school or continuing education, households transitioning from W-2, out of the Supportive Housing Program, or fleeing domestic violence.

HomeBuyer/Rehab (HHR):

- \$4,309,873 in HOME funds was encumbered for 21 HOME HHR grantees representing the first year funding for a 2-year grant award.
- Eligible activities included acquisition (downpayment and closing cost assistance), acquisition and rehabilitation (acquisition of substandard properties and their rehabilitation), and new construction (new housing development for low-income buyers). Homebuyers must earn no more than 80% of their county's median income.
- Eligible activities also included rehabilitation of existing rental properties. Property owners rent at least 90% of their units to households with incomes at or below 60% of the CMI.
- Eligible activities also include making owner-occupied dwellings occupied by physically disabled residents accessible and bringing the home up to appropriate housing quality standards.

HOME WI Fresh Start Program (WFS):

- \$328,570 in HOME funds, combined with \$288,000 in funds from the Department of Corrections, was provided grants in 8 communities for 9 sites.
- WFS provides at-risk youth, ages 16-24, with education, skills, and career direction leading to economic self-sufficiency through opportunities for meaningful service in their communities, in addition to helping meet the need for affordable housing for low to moderate income families.
- Eligible activities: outreach and recruitment, education and job training, trainee wage, support services, leadership development and job placement education.

Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) Program:

- DOA-Division of Housing awarded \$2,778,568 of ESG funds to 26 non-profit providers and units of local government, representing 132 agencies, for the purpose of serving homeless people and households at risk of losing their housing.
- The application process for ESG, State Transitional Housing, and the State Homeless Prevention Program were combined into one competitive grant.
- ESG funds were allocated on a percentage basis to regions for eligible activities: renovation, rehabilitation, and conversion of buildings for use as emergency shelters or transitional housing for the homeless; provision of essential services; payment of maintenance and operations; and homeless prevention.

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) Program:

- \$428,363 were awarded to the Aids Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARC/W) to assist 145 households.
- Funds were made available through RFP process.
- ARC/W subcontracted with providers around the State.

Continuum of Care:

- \$252,088 for the Shelter Plus Care program was awarded to Community Action Inc. of Rock and Walworth Counties. The Shelter Plus Care program provides permanent housing and supportive services to homeless persons with a disability.
- \$371,429 for the HMIS through the Continuum of Care grant award, which includes costs related to the operation and use of the federally required HMIS.
